First a bit of Oracles History!

On 24th November, 1995 Tenterfield Shire Council committed \$10,000 as a seeding fund to help get a bush poetry festival project underway in Tenterfield. The proposal was submitted to council by the new owner of the Tenterfield Saddlery, Mr. Brian Meldon. The date for the Tenterfield Saddler Australian Bush Poet's Festival was set for the Queensland Labour Day long weekend of 3rd to 6th May, 1996.

Mr. Meldon always said to be successful the festival had to have the backing of the town and so a community committee known as Tenterfield United Organisations, comprising members of local clubs and service organisations was formed on 3rd January 1996 to assist Mr. Meldon and his staff with the festival logistics. At this meeting a new festival name was adopted and the festival would be known as Tenterfield Saddler Oracles of the Bush. The name Oracles of the Bush was proposed by Tenterfield journalist and 2016 Oracles Legend, Mr. Ken Halliday. Event Director, Anne Bishop presented details of an extravagant official launch and draft program to the meeting.

Tenterfield Saddler Oracles of the Bush festival was launched at a star studded event at the Tamworth Country Music Festival on 26th January 1996.

Tenterfield Shire Council granted a last minute request on 24th February, 1996 to underwrite a cost of \$6500 to employ poets for the festival as the seeding funds had all been expended on the launch.

The 3rd of May, 1996 came and so did the rains. The major rain event cut roads in and out of Tenterfield but the show went on. Many patrons didn't make it to town but travellers trapped in town joined with locals to experience a magic weekend celebrating bush culture and much needed rain.

On reviewing the festival results, the Tenterfield United Organisation committee adopted a proposal to move the festival date forward a few weeks so not to clash with events in surrounding areas of the Granite Belt and Glen Innes and also use the timing to promote the famous Tenterfield Autumn colours. The committee also resolved to change the



format slightly and encourage more amateur poets. Mr. Meldon did not approve of these decisions and on 27th June 1996 it was announced that he had withdrawn his commercial support and the Tenterfield Saddlery name from the festival.

At the AGM of Tenterfield United Organisations in August, 1996 a new committee was elected, all of whom were local volunteers. Ownership of Oracles of the Bush was now solely in the hands of the Tenterfield community and the very first Tenterfield Oracles of the Bush event was set down for 18th, 19th and 20th April, 1997! Consequently, 25th to 28th March, 2021 is a celebration of 25 years of Australian bush culture, Tenterfield hospitality and friendship.

THE LEGEND

After the forced cancellation of Oracles of the Bush last year event organisers continued planning for Oracles 25th anniversary in 2021 with determined positivity. It was decided to combine as much of the 2020 cancelled content into 2021 including the 2020 Legend Induction.

Finding the right legend to complement the 2021 theme ‘Then and Now’ and blend with the 2020 theme ‘Behind the Scenes’ was challenging and discussions were held over many meetings.

Then came the light bulb moment!

There is a relatively small group of dedicated passionate volunteers who have worked tirelessly to make Oracles happen every year for 25 years -

THEY ARE TENTERFIELD LEGENDS!

Looking at the different personalities over the years it would be fair to ask how could they come together and work as one. Many have tried to figure it out but there is no simple answers just accept the fact that these people are unique and legendary.

Regardless of the length of involvement, every person has equally and willingly contributed their individual skills, time and passion to Tenterfield. They aren’t necessarily bush poetry fanatics. Their drive and passion is derived from their love of Tenterfield. They have a strong desire to give back to the town and contribute to its economic and social advancement. It is that drive that binds this diverse group of people together each year to present the annual ‘Oracles of the Bush’, Bush Poetry Festival.

Collectively they have a long list of achievements including 25 bush poetry festivals, ‘Community Event of the Year’ Australia Day award, Tenterfield Shire Council Business & Tourism Awards Hall of Fame Induction, Tenterfield Shire Council Business & Tourism Awards ‘Event of the Year’ 4 times, hosting a ‘People’s Picnic’ on New Year’s Day 2001 as the first official Tenterfield Centenary of Federation celebrations, hosting the 2006 NSW Bush Poetry State Championships with 139 entrants, 25 professional school workshops for Australian literature appreciation, participation in the 2002/2005 National Trust Heritage Festival trail, donated over \$35,000 to community groups to be re-invested locally, donated \$5,000 to Tenterfield Shire Council for acoustic improvements at Tenterfield Memorial Hall and donated over \$1000 to local RFS. Each year they continually promote Tenterfield through their annual event marketing attracting visitors to the festival and encouraging them to stay and explore Tenterfield.

The 2021 legend title is not about collective committee achievements, it is to acknowledge every single unique character

who has been involved in the organisation of the Oracles of the Bush Festival since 1997.

Early organisers understood that Tenterfield could not realistically host thousands of people as proposed in the initial festival concept. As a result Oracles has developed into an exclusive boutique bush poetry festival, a festival championed by the best professional poets in Australia. Organisation of the event begins 9 months prior to the date. The committee first come together around July for initial planning and continue to meet until the festival weekend

Solid foundations laid in those early years have stood firm and guided new committees throughout the years. From day one sharing skills and experience and providing mentorship has been a trademark of the Oracles of the Bush organising committee.

The first few years saw Oracles of the Bush supported by several high profile commercial and media sponsors. These sponsorships and marketing opportunities were the result of professional expertise bought to the table by Suzie and Mark van Laarhoven. Suzie and Mark were mentors to many committee members and their knowledge helped set Oracles in the right direction.

Up until 2001 events were held at 10 different venues. It was a logistical nightmare constantly transporting chairs and equipment from one venue to the next in a short time frame. Often details got lost in the transmission. I recall one Saturday waiting at Paul's Barn for Phil Ainsworth to arrive with chairs to set up for the evening concert. Phil eventually arrived in his car! Turns out he popped home, parked the ute in the garage, freshened up and returned to the barn in his car leaving the chairs on the ute in his garage. From that day on a committee member was charged with making sure Phil got the memo and understood the instructions. Don't let that little incident detract from the many

years Phil dedicated to Oracles including president for 5 years. He often complained he was bullied by the predominately female committee but secretly he thrived on it.

When cash was THE thing and banks closed at 3pm the first mobile bank was introduced in Tenterfield in 1997. The then treasurer, Julie Hurtz, converted the boot of her car into a mobile cash facility. She spent the weekend visiting multiple venues dispensing change and collecting takings. Everything was balanced, labelled and stashed in the boot under the spare wheel until the bank opened on Monday morning. It was safe as a bank, after all only a brave or very stupid person would attempt to steal Mrs. Moneybag's commodore.

Credit must be given to those individual committee members, past and present, who oversee both the written and performance competitions and the school workshops. The competition procedures have been finely tuned over many years under the leadership of Geoff and Jann Newman. It would be impossible to estimate the personal time these two have invested in Oracles. They have now retired and their role has been capably taken up by Lara Flanagan.

Geoff and Jann are peas in the pod and you don't get one without the other. When Jann took on the role of President for a number of years Geoff was lucky enough to land all the jobs President Jann didn't want to do. Their contribution has been outstanding and Geoff always added that bit of class and sensibility when the girls were misbehaving.

Over time certain members have developed quirky specialties that need to be respected. Here I reference Robyn Petrie, affectionately known as the 'chair lady'. Robyn is OIC of chairs and is a tad fanatical. As funny as it is to watch when an uninitiated helper comes along and begins to straighten them, Robyn's chair fetish is valued and means no one else has to worry about the seating. She is also known as the 'Gravy Queen'. Give her a box of Gravox and she can fix any kitchen disaster.

It is possible that to qualify for committee you need to love a chat. Our fearless leader for a number of years was Joan Harvey. Joan would talk to anyone, anywhere, anytime but give her a microphone and she was lethal. Once she had that mike in her hands anything could happen and usually did. The one thing you could be sure of was what she said had little to do with the notes in her hand. She had a knack of completely confusing patrons about daylight saving. By the time Joan finished no one had any idea whether breakfast next morning was at 8am DLS time or 8am EST. That yellow shirt and gift of the gab made Joan one of Oracles greatest ambassadors.

The committee graduated from green shirts to maroon and then to the famous yellow shirts. The yellow shirts were the brainchild of Debbie Roberts. With the introduction of the yellow shirts came the nickname 'yellow shirt brigade'. Debbie loved her accessories

and introduced the pearl concept to the Oracles uniform. Debbie convinced us a bit of glamour was necessary reminding us that Jackie O did say 'Pearls are always appropriate'.

One of the most famous things to come out of Oracles is, without doubt, Patti Ainsworth's 'Train Smash'. A superb tomato and onion based creation best served with bacon and eggs in the park on Sunday morning. The remaining ingredients have always been a mystery but the biggest mystery is how a responsibility as big as train smash was passed onto someone with zero culinary skills. Armed with wine I easily recruited Jenni Donges and Julie Thompson to do the work. The annual 'wine and train smash cook up' is now a firm social calendar favourite and most likely explains why the ingredient list remains a mystery. Patti would be proud of us.

We all love a bit of romance and Oracles takes full credit for bringing one couple together. It was very special when our 'chair lady', Robyn and 1998 Legend, Paul Petrie snuck off to the coast and got married in 2015. Yellow bridesmaids would have been nice. 😊

Good secretaries take the pressure off the President. That being the case Oracles presidents have had an easy ride. There have been some cracker secretaries over the years. Patrons will be familiar with the smiling face of our pocket rocket Carolynne Newman, the current and long term secretary. Her organisational skills and event knowledge are exceptional. The work she does behind the scenes is phenomenal. Carolynne is a no fuss girl and just gets on with the job. She has an uncanny way of working through a crisis, shows no panic and on the surface no one would guess things were not going to plan. During Oracles weekend the most common comment you will hear is 'just ask Carolynne'. Do I have some stories to tell about Carolynne? The answer is 'yes plenty' but I am smart enough not to go public.

In 2009 the committee decided to publish the program booklet themselves. Jan Cross and Marilyn Brown took on the mammoth task of selling advertising. A time consuming job which is followed by hours of follow up visits, liaising with the printers and proof reading. As treasurer Jan has kept her finger on the

financial pulse and ensured the viability of the booklet.

Her offsider Marilyn certainly is a great marketer but her true value to the committee is measured by lemon slice. Every year Marilyn generously provides sweet treats for the tea and coffee stations. Every year the tray of lemon slice mysteriously disappears. For those in the know it can be found stored in the back fridge with a sign attached 'Not for public use - committee only'.

The most unbelievable aspect of Oracles of the Bush Inc committees, past and present, is their unity and lack of politics. Unlike many organisations there is no conflict and every opinion is respected. Certainly there can be robust discussions but in the end the majority rules vote actually works and is accepted.

This has been a difficult piece to compile and is about one third of my original draft. The comments here are simply my thoughts and a tiny slice of the stories I could share. Every single person has a story and their contribution equally valuable but apparently I am not allowed to take up the full booklet.

In closing I must pay tribute to the late Patti Ainsworth whose passion for Tenterfield and Oracles of the Bush touched us all. Her legacy continues to inspire us to keep smiling and continue Creating another Tenterfield Legend.




Meet the Poets

Having grown up on a fourth-generation beef farm business in Lang Lang Victoria, country runs through Bec's blood. Steeped in the music of Slim Dusty, Shirley Thoms, Loretta Lynn, Johnny Horton, John Denver and John Williamson as a youngster, she learnt the guitar and piano in her teens as has been writing and composing music ever since.

Bec's husband, Pete Wilson, a musician by trade, now produces her music and comes with a repertoire and knowledge to ensure that it is crafted in her true style, and also supports her as her lead guitarist and harmonist at her live gigs, as well as some marriage banter between them, just for fun.

Bec has released 6 albums, included a duet album with husband Pete Wilson which all encompass her own written material with some remakes of songs which have inspired both her song writing and as performing artists including the popular Calypso by John Denver and Just an Old Cattle Dog by Slim Dusty.

In the Meantime Bec (and Pete) maintains her career as a paramedic in her now home base Murchison, in the heart of Victoria.

Looming Legends Poetry Competition

The central focus of Oracles Bush Poetry Festival is the Looming Legends Poetry competitions. There are two distinct categories to the competition – the written section and the performance section. The written section is judged prior to the festival weekend and winners announced at the Looming Legend Grand Final on Sunday. The performance section is spread over three days with heats on Friday and Saturday and the Looming Legend final on Sunday which is the finale of the weekend.



There is also a children's concert on Friday where our youngest competitors perform, and the children's written competition winners are announced. The children's concert is a lovely way to kick start the amateur section of our festival.

The Looming Legends is a fabulous poetry competition judged by professional poets and integral part of the Oracles of the Bush weekend.

In addition to prize money the senior winner is presented with a unique Tenterfield trophy. The trophy is an exclusively designed clock handcrafted from the cork of Tenterfield's famous cork tree. Tenterfield's giant cork tree, still growing in Wood Street, was brought from England by Edward Parker in a jam tin in 1861. It is believed to be one of the largest cork trees in Australia.

As availability to the cork tree branches diminishes the 2021 could be the last trophy to be crafted for Oracles. An even greater reason for budding poets to enter and perform in 2021.

The Looming Legends has one of the biggest prize pools in Australia. We are pleased to have the senior competition sponsored by Tenterfield Shire Council and the Junior sections sponsored by Ray White Rural Tenterfield. The Tenterfield and Districts Historical Society during 2021 celebrates 50 years of continuous operations. Centenary Cottage museum was established in the house at 136 Logan Street previously occupied by Archie Miller. The house itself was constructed during 1871, Being built by then local builder Michael Egan. The house has had a number of residents during its 100 years occupancy and information regarding the various occupants is displayed in the parlour room of the Centenary cottage museum.

The Museum also contains exhibits such as Military history of General Chauvel who was born at Tabulam and lead the Australian light Horse regiment at the battle of Beersheba during 1917 plus, his sister Lillian Chauvel, A renown water colour and oils painter and several of her paintings.

The museum contains many memories of a yesteryear and history of Tenterfield and the surrounding district.
